- “The placticity of nationalism. The case of Ion Dragoumis and Greek Irredentism (1903-1913)” 27/2/2016

Michalis Kaliakatsos holds a Doctoral Degree in History from the ‘Byzantine, Ottoman and Modern Greek Studies’ department of the University of Birmingham, UK. His thesis, for which he achieved a scholarship from the Greek State Scholarship Foundation, is entitled: ‘Dragoumis, Macedonia and the Ottoman Empire (1903-1913): The Great Idea, Nationalism and Greek-Ottomanism’. He has graduated from the ‘Sociology’ department of *Panteion University* (1999) and has received an MA Degree in ‘Philosophy and Social Theory’ from the University of Warwick. In his thesis he deals with the issue of national identities and the contradictions, modifications and plasticity of nationalist ideas during the nationalist explosion and the development of both modernist and anti-Westernist trends in Greece, the Balkans and the Ottoman Empire in early 20th century. In 2008 he was granted the best doctoral thesis award in Modern Greek Studies by the Hellenic Foundation. Since 2010 he has been teaching history, sociology and politics in several structures and programs of lifelong learning education.
